William N. Dill Youth Development Center Opens with Celebration



The new William N. Dill Youth Development Center was honored with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on April 18, 2024 that was attended by local leaders, donors, and friends of ECH. A new chapter in how ECH approaches residential care is now beginning within its walls.

Youth come to live on our campus to receive treatment for mental, emotional and behavioral health challenges related to significant trauma or abuse. They are connected with a team of professionals who wrap them in care and create a customized plan for meeting their individual needs. They heal in a safe and structured therapeutic environment. They get the tools they need to continue healing once they return to the community when their treatment is complete.

Our residential treatment program helps young people develop skills that will help them be successful for the rest of their lives. Most importantly, the program provides hope that anything is possible.


ECH Welcomes New Leaders

Donor Spotlight: Tressa Neely

Tressa Neely admits that she did not have a close relationship with her mother as a child. Even as an adult, there was a distance between them that never was completely bridged. When Tressa's mother passed recently, Tressa discovered that her mother kept journals.

While reading the journals, she learned that her mother spent three years at Every Child's Hope (then the German Protestant Orphans Home) in the early 1940's.

"I didn't know much about ECH until I read her journals and read about the work, but it was important for me to honor my mother as a way to heal our relationship. She was loved there."

"She loved it there," Tressa discovered. Her mother recounted how she played with other children in the park and traded items for bubble gum.

When asked why she makes a monthly donation, Tressa shared that ECH helped shape her mother's character which was passed on to her and my children. "I want to bring happiness to the world."





Residential **Treatment**

ECH's nationally-recognized residential treatment program is licensed to provide intensive, full-time care for young people ages 6-18. Youth receive individual, group, and family counseling as well as case management and psychiatric services. During their stay with us, they find a safe place to address their unique challenges and learn skills that can help them return to family and community life.

The William N. Dill Youth Development Center was under construction throughout 2023 and will replace our existing cottages with a new setting where youth can heal.
